New samples received confirm our former view that there are at least six well defined areas in which different sets of indigenous races are cultivated by the Indians: Pilcomayo-Paraguay-Paraná Basin, divided into two areas: (a) of the Guarani and (b) of the Caingang; (c) the Western and Southern margin of the Amazon Basin, covering territory belonging to Peru, Bolivia and Central Brazil, characterized by races with long ears and strongly interlocked rows; (d) the eastern part of the Amazon Basin, up to the borders of the Guianas, showing some relation to the former region, since interlocked rows are still found; (e) the Atlantic coast with a very hard yellow flint race; (f) in the NW-region bordering Colombia, races are cultivated which seem to belong in a general way to the southern Colombian-Ecuadorian area. No samples were received so far of the central part of the Amazon Valley, around Manáus, and it seems possible that no indigenous maize exists in this region.
