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1. Recombination in the alsh2 region.

Backcross data on recombination rate in three different genetical backgrounds, having in common the "Texas" male sterile cytoplasm, are reported for \underline{a}_1 \underline{sh}_2 markers in coupling in the following table:

The crossover value is clearly lower than that previously reported (0.27%). However, it is undecided whether this is due to different environmental conditions (including the T type cytoplasm) or to a difference in nuclear genotypes, although the latter interpretation appears less likely because of the uniform behavior of the different backgrounds of the inbred lines used. It is interesting that this backgrounds of the same order of magnitude as at least one intracistron value is of the same order of magnitude as at least one intracistron recombination rate: wx produces, according to our data, about 1% by pollen grains, mainly as a result of the recombination process.

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2. Effect of storage on x-rayed pollen.

By applying Everett's technique it has been possible to prolong the pollen life-span and to study the effect of storage on x-rayed pollen (1750 roengten in about 7!).

The data appearing in the following table are roughly in agreement with those obtained with storage of dry irradiated seeds:
